



Second Sunday of Easter


First Reading – Acts 5:12-16 (*The numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily.*)

Social Justice Thought for the Week:

Easter hope and working for Justice.

Easter has come. He is risen. Jesus' disciples experienced him as alive and with them again. They felt his presence and responded with joy and courage. Jesus alive again is God's yes to how he lived his life, to his mission and ministry. It is God's yes to the Beatitudes, to the liberation of the oppressed and the freeing of the captives. It is God's yes to the clothing of the naked and the feeding of the hungry. It is God's yes to Mary's Magnificat that the mighty will be pulled down and the lowly will be lifted up, that the poor will be filled with good things and the rich being sent away empty. It is God's yes to the hope that injustice can come to an end and peace, compassion and justice can, and will be, our future.

For Easter hope to be alive in our midst today, each of us needs to respond with joy and courage. We need to be willing to be the hands and feet, the word and action of Jesus in our world. We need to experience God's yes and live in ways that seek true peace and justice, by living God's compassion as Jesus did. Easter provides hope for us because it shows us God's hope for the world. Easter hope does not leave us unchanged as it calls us to live like Jesus and be God's yes through what we do and say. Easter hope is about working for justice and about seeking God's hopes for our world. We pray for the courage to live God's yes.

Anzac Day & Easter

Each year our celebration of Anzac Day follows soon after our Easter liturgies. It was not that long ago that Anzac Day fell on Easter Monday. This was a point not lost on the Liturgical Commission in the Archdiocese of Brisbane. In the column, 'Liturgy Lines', Elizabeth Harrington once wrote:

Anzac Day is a deep and complex event in the Australian psyche. Civic rituals and prayers occur in every town and suburb in the land. We also pick up the themes, nuances and mood in our Mass for the day. Anzac Day carries multiple overtones: It is a martyr's day when we commemorate the sacrifice of the fallen and honour those who gave their life that we might live. It is a commemoration of the dead when we commend those who have died in war to the Lord, especially members of our own families.

It is a prayer for peace, because all war is horrible no matter what heroism it reveals. It is a day of national identity, an Australian 'coming of age' a decade and a half after the formation of the commonwealth. It is a story of victory in defeat, survival and life in the face of overwhelming odds.

Anzac Day always occurs close to Easter.

One cannot but be impressed by the Easter symbolism which permeates all the interwoven themes of Anzac Day. It is deeply moving to recognise that at the heart of the Australian psyche is the mystery which we understand to be paschal, the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

This year we won't be having Mass on Anzac Day because of its proximity to the Sunday Mass, and also to allow parishioners the opportunity to attend early and mid-morning civic services.

We will however pick up on the "themes, nuances and mood" in our Masses over the weekend.

Easter Sunday

First Reading – Acts 5:12-16

The numbers of people who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily

The faithful all used to meet by common consent in the Portico of Solomon. No one else ever dared to join them, but the people were loud in their praise and the numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Christ increased steadily. So many signs and wonders were worked among the people at the hands of the apostles that the sick were even taken out into the streets and laid on beds and sleeping-mats in the hope that at least the shadow of Peter might fall across some of them as he went past. People even came crowding in from the towns round about Jerusalem, bringing with them their sick and those tormented by unclean spirits, and all of them were cured.

Second Reading – Revelation 1:9-13, 17-19

I was dead, and now I am to live for ever and ever



My name is John, and through our union in Jesus I am your kin and share your sufferings, your domain, and all you endure. I was on the island of Patmos for having preached God's word and witnessed for Jesus; it was the resurrection day and the Spirit possessed me, and I heard a voice behind me, shouting like a trumpet, 'Write down all that you see in a book.' I turned round to see who had spoken to me, and when I turned I saw seven golden lamp-stands and, surrounded by them, a figure like a Human One, dressed in a long robe tied at the waist with a golden girdle.

When I saw the one who appeared, I fell in a dead faint, and a hand touched me and a voice said, 'Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One, I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever, and I hold the keys of death and of the underworld. Now write down all that you see of present happenings and things that are still to come.'

Gospel – John 20:1-9

Eight days later, Jesus came again and stood among them

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you', and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw Jesus, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.'

'As the Creator sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit.'



For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Risen One', Thomas answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them.

The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them and said: 'Peace be with you'. Then speaking to Thomas: 'Thomas, put your

finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My God and my all!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the only begotten of God, and that believing this you may have life through Jesus' name.

A Reflection by Pope Francis

Today's Gospel passage recounts that on the day of Easter, Jesus appears to his disciples in the Upper Room, in the evening, bearing three gifts: peace, joy, the apostolic mission.

The first words he says are: "Peace be with you". The Risen One brings authentic peace, because through his sacrifice on the Cross he achieved reconciliation between God and humanity, and he conquered sin and death. This is peace. His disciples needed this peace first and foremost, because, after the Master was arrested and condemned to death, they fell into dismay and fear. Jesus appears among them alive and, in showing the wounds —Jesus wanted to preserve his wounds — in his glorious body, gives peace as the fruit of his victory. But that evening the Apostle Thomas was not present. Apprised of this extraordinary event, incredulous at the testimony of the other Apostles, he

demands to personally verify the truth of what they assert. Eight days later, just as today, the apparition is repeated: Jesus confronts Thomas' incredulity, inviting him to touch His wounds. They are the sources of peace, because they are the sign of the immense love of Jesus who defeated the forces hostile to man: sin, death. He invites him to touch the wounds. It is a lesson for us, as if Jesus were to tell all of us: "If you are not at peace, touch my wounds".

Touch Jesus' wounds, which are the many problems, difficulties, persecutions, illnesses of so many suffering people. Are you not at peace? Go. Go to visit someone who is the symbol of Jesus' wounds. Touch Jesus' wounds. Mercy flows from those wounds. That is why today is the Sunday of Mercy. A saint used to say that Jesus' crucified body is like a bundle of mercy, which reaches each of us through his wounds. All of us need mercy, as we know. Let us draw near to Jesus and touch his wounds in our suffering brothers and sisters. Jesus' wounds are a treasure: mercy issues from them. Let us be courageous and touch Jesus' wounds. With these wounds he stands before the Father; he reveals them to the Father, as if to say: "Father, this is the price; these wounds are what I paid for my brothers and sisters". With his wounds Jesus intercedes before the Father. He gives us mercy if we draw near, and he intercedes for us. Do not forget Jesus' wounds.



The second gift that the Risen Jesus brings to his disciples is joy. The evangelist recounts that "the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord". And there is also a verse, in Luke's version, that says that they disbelieved for joy. We too, perhaps when something incredible, beautiful has happened, might say: "I cannot believe it; this is not true!". This is how the disciples were. They disbelieved for joy. This is the joy that Jesus brings us. If you are sad, if you are not at peace, look to Jesus Crucified; look to the Risen Jesus; look at his wounds and receive that joy.

And then, in addition to peace and joy, Jesus also brings the gift of mission to the disciples. He says to them: "As the Father has sent me, even so I send you". Jesus' Resurrection is the beginning of a new dynamism of love, capable of transforming the world with the presence of the Holy Spirit.

This second Sunday of Easter, we are invited to approach Christ with faith, opening our heart to peace, joy and the mission. But let us not forget Jesus' wounds because from them come peace, joy and the strength for the mission. Let us entrust this prayer to the maternal intercession of the Virgin Mary, Queen of Heaven and Earth.

The Universal Prayer Second Sunday of Easter 24th April

Celebrant: *Sisters and brothers, the risen Jesus, who greets his fearful disciples with the blessing of peace, is the one acclaimed as Lord and God by the apostle Thomas. We pray in Christ's name.*

May all parishes and communities in the Church be united in prayer and with concern for the sick, as was the first Christian community in Jerusalem. **Christ, hear our prayer.**

May all Christians affirm their belief in the risen Jesus as their Lord and God and have a respectful love for each other. **Christ, hear our prayer.**

May the people of Ukraine, filled with fear, find peace and courage through their faith in the risen Jesus and be reassured by his words: *Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One.* **Christ, hear our prayer.**

May Eastern Catholics and Orthodox Christians celebrating the Sunday of Resurrection today, hear and follow the words of Jesus, *Receive the Holy Spirit. As the Father sent me, so I am sending you.* **Christ, hear our prayer.**

May this Australian Federal Election see candidates and political parties honour truth, work for the common good, and seek justice for the poor and vulnerable, in Australia and beyond. **Christ, hear our prayer.**

May tomorrow's Anzac Day cause Australians to reflect on the futility of war, and so experience a deeper commitment to work for peace between nations, within nations, communities, and families. **Christ, hear our prayer.**

May those who have died through war and violence receive eternal life through the name of Jesus. We pray especially for our loved ones who have died recently: **Vonnie Zeller**. Our loved ones whose anniversaries are at this time: **Mary Lee, Reginald Missen, Dorelle Pinington, Colleen Hart**. The deceased priests of our Diocese... all those who are sick.... **Christ, hear our prayer.**

Celebrant: *Father, with St Thomas we acclaim Jesus as our Lord and God, and as we give thanks for every blessing received, help us, in this continuing time of concern and anxiety, to put all our trust in Jesus, who lives and reigns for ever and ever. AMEN*




