

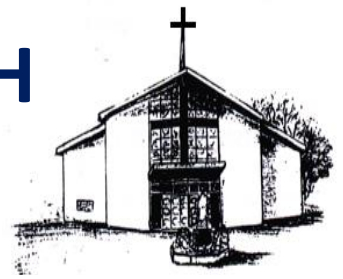

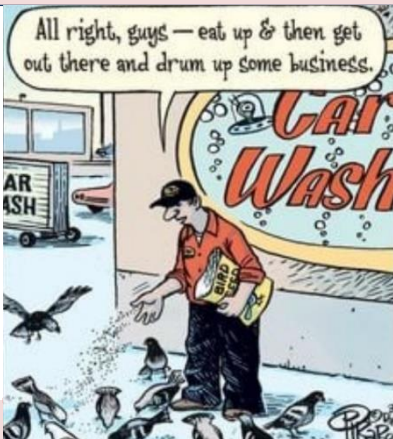

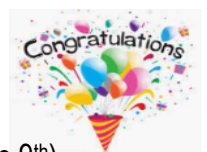

AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS CONFERENCE

**BISHOPS STATEMENT ON THE
FEDERAL ELECTION**

The Australian Bishops have released their 2022 Election Statement: Towards a Better Kind of Politics". Last week we presented a 'dot point' summary in the newsletter. Today we provide the media release in full, with a link to accessing the whole statement online.

MEDIA RELEASE:

Australia's Catholic bishops have called for a shakeup that focuses the country's politics on the common good of all, including – and especially – those who struggle to participate in the community.

Australian Catholic Bishops Conference President Archbishop Mark Coleridge said no one political party fully embodies Catholic social teaching. The bishops are, however, offering an election statement to encourage Catholics and people of good will to reflect on the good they can do for their community by using their vote for the good of all.

Archbishop Coleridge said, "we all long for what Pope Francis calls 'a better kind of politics, one truly at the service of the common good'". "This 'better' politics pursues the common good of all Australians by recognising the dignity of every individual and the solidarity we all share as a national community," Archbishop Coleridge said.

"Since the last Federal Election, we have seen the impact and the challenges of a global pandemic, floods, summers of bushfires, wild weather events and a world on edge because of military conflict. "Foremost in the minds of many will be Australia's economic recovery from the effects of COVID19. The societal disruptions from the pandemic have revealed significant levels of poverty and disadvantage within Australia.

We need a new social contract that focuses the economy more clearly on the common good." The statement highlights several key issues that the bishops have identified and which they encouraged readers to consider when preparing to vote. Among them is the provision of high-quality palliative care across Australia, "to ensure that no one is pressured into choosing assisted suicide because palliative care is unavailable".

The statement advocates for vulnerable people in the community, including those in need of aged care, First Nations peoples, asylum-seekers and refugees.

It calls for a government committed to the common good that will deliver a medium to long-term plan for eradicating poverty in Australia. The bishops also say people who have a religious faith should be protected from discrimination, "including the ability to undertake activities and form religious bodies that can pursue their religious mission".

"This includes common sense provisions to allow religious schools to preference the hiring of staff who support the school's ethos," the statement says.

The Laurie Reed Collection is taken up 5 times a year to provide support for people who come to the Parish Centre with immediate and pressing needs. Laurie Reedy (Margaret's Husband) was a parishioner for many years, an active member of the Vincent de Paul, and a generous supporter of the migrant and refugee families of the parish. Those who come to the parish centre with needs that are not immediate are referred to Vincent de Paul who help with specific longer-term programs. Since the beginning of 2022, St Anthony's parish office, on your behalf, has helped people who needed fuel to attend funerals and support sick relatives who live away, as well as supplying emergency groceries. Thank you for your generosity which has allowed this fund to help so many.

Fifth Sunday of Easter

First Reading – Acts 14:21-27

They gave an account to the church of all that God had done with them

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Risen Christ in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how the door of faith had been opened to the gentiles.

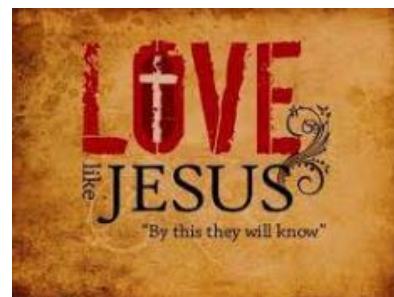
Gospel – John 13:31-35

A Reflection by Pope Francis

Today's Gospel takes us to the Upper Room to have us listen to some of the words that Jesus addressed to the disciples in the "farewell discourse" before his Passion. After washing the feet of the twelve [Apostles], he says to them: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another". But in what sense does Jesus call this commandment "new"? Because we know that already in the Old Testament, God had ordered members of his people to love their neighbour as themselves (cf. Lev 19:18). To those who asked him which was the greatest commandment of the Law, Jesus himself would reply that the first was to love God with all your heart and the second, to love your neighbour as yourself (cf. Mt 22:38-39).

What then, is the novelty of this commandment that Jesus entrusts to his disciples? Why does he call

it a "new commandment"? The old commandment of love became new because it was made complete with this addition: "as I have loved you", "love one another as I have loved you". The novelty lies wholly in Jesus Christ's love, with which he gave his life for us. It is God's universal love, without any conditions or limits, which reaches its culmination on the cross. In that moment of extreme abasement, and in that moment of abandonment to the Father, the Son of God showed and gave to the world the fullness of love. Thinking back to Christ's passion and agony, the disciples understood the meaning of his words: "As I have loved you, so you too must love one another".

Jesus loved us first. He loved us despite our frailties, our limitations and our human weaknesses. It was he who ensured we become worthy of his boundless and never-ending love. By giving us this new commandment, he asks us to love one another, not only and not so much with our love, but with his, which the Holy Spirit instils in our hearts if we invoke him with faith. In this way — and only in this way — can we love one another not only as we love ourselves but as he loved us, that is, infinitely more. Indeed, God loves us much more than we love ourselves. And thus, we can spread everywhere the seed of love that renews relationships between people and opens horizons of hope. Jesus always opens horizons of hope. His love opens horizons of hope. This love makes us become new men, brothers and sisters in the Lord, and makes us the new People of God, that is the Church, in which everyone is called to love Christ and to love one another in him.

The love that was manifested in Christ's Cross and that he calls us to live is the only force that transforms our hearts of stone into hearts of flesh; the only force capable of transforming our heart is Jesus' love, if we too love with this love. And this love makes us capable of loving our enemies and forgiving those who have offended us. I will ask you a question; each of you can respond in your heart. Am I capable of loving my enemies? We all have people — whether 'enemies' I do not know — but who do not get along with us, who are on "the other side"; or some have people who have hurt them.... Am I capable of loving those people, that man, that woman who hurt me, who offended me? Am I capable of forgiving them? Each of you can respond in your heart. Jesus' love shows us the other as a present or future member of the community of Jesus' friends. It spurs us to dialogue and helps us to listen to one another and to mutually get to know each other. Love opens up toward the other, becoming the foundation of human relationships. It renders us capable of overcoming the barriers of our own weaknesses and prejudices. Jesus' love within us creates bridges, teaches new paths, triggers the dynamism of fraternity. With her maternal intercession, may the Virgin Mary help us to receive from her son Jesus the gift of his commandment, and from the Holy Spirit, the strength to put it into practice in everyday life.

Ordination Date Announced:

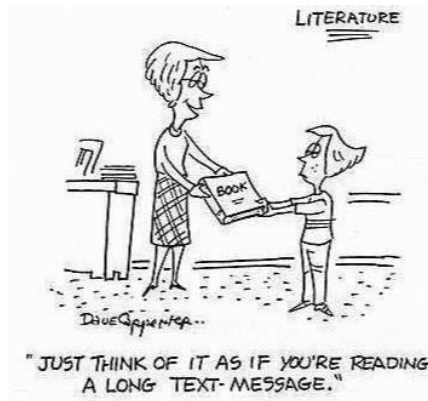

Love One Another

Over the years, and particularly in the years following the Second Vatican Council, the input of music into our liturgy has enhanced our participation in liturgical celebration.

Much loved traditional hymns such as 'Faith of our Fathers' and 'Hail Queen of Heaven' gave way in the 1970's to more 'folk' type hymns that have since evolved to the music we have at Mass today.

In our liturgical celebrations there are many composers, who are virtually anonymous, but with whose work we have become familiar. As scripture is put to music, it certainly enhances our understanding of sacred text.

We gain a deeper appreciation of the original intent of the verse. This could be said of the musical arrangement most associated with the text of today's Gospel Reading, 'A New Commandment'.

The author and composer of the well-known hymn, as the adaptation of John 13:34-35, is usually listed as "unknown". It has not even been possible to determine when it was first published.

However, 'A New Commandment' remains familiar to us in music and song, and I am sure has reinforced for many over the years just what Jesus was trying to tell his followers in the Gospel commandment.

In a world torn apart by violence and acts of war we are called simply to love one another. By this, it is that we will be known. It is a simple message that often gets overcomplicated, yet one that stands the test of time.

In life when things seem to overwhelm us it is good that we evoke the simplicity of those three words, the command central to this weekend's Gospel: Love. One. Another.

*A new commandment I give unto you
That you love one another As I have loved you
That you love one another As I have loved you
By this the world will know that you are My disciples
If you have love, one for another*
