Amen.



THROUGH THE DESERT GOD LEADS US TO FREEDOM

At the start of Mass each week during Lent we will reflect on an excerpt from the Lenten Message of Pope Francis for 2024.

Week Two: When the Lord calls out to Moses from the burning bush, he immediately shows that he is a God who sees and, above all, hears: "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Today too, the cry of so many of our oppressed brothers and sisters rises to heaven. Let us ask ourselves: Do we hear that cry? Does it trouble us? Does it move us? The witness of many of my brother bishops and a great number of those who work for peace and justice has increasingly convinced me that we need to combat a deficit of hope that stifles dreams and the silent cry that reaches to heaven and moves the heart of God. This "deficit of hope" is not unlike the nostalgia for slavery that paralysed Israel in the desert and prevented it from moving forward.

Ronita is 22. She lives with her husband and two children in a barangay (local district) in Quezon City, which is situated in Metro Manila in the Philippines.

Ronita left school when she became pregnant as a teenager. This could have had a life-long impact on her ability to find work and provide for her family but, thankfully, she heard about the Alternative Learning System (ALS) program run by the Faithful Companions of Jesus (FCJ), Caritas Australia's local partners in the Philippines.

Through the FCJ, Ronita was able to re-enrol in her studies and continue learning in a safe and flexible environment – even with the arrival of her second child.

After completing her ALS classes, Ronita went on to earn her Grade 12 Senior High School Diploma. With her new diploma, Ronita has now secured a job at a call centre and is looking to a brighter future for her whole family.

"I have now graduated senior school and I am so proud of myself," she said. "I feel hopeful for the future... Now it's not impossible for me to achieve my dream... Thank you."

Scripture Readings — Second Sunday in Lent

First Reading – Genesis 22:1-2, 9-13, 15-18

God put Abraham to the test. 'Abraham, Abraham' God called. 'Here I am' Abraham replied. 'Take your child,' God said 'your only child Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him as a burnt offering, on a mountain I will point out to you.'

When they arrived at the place God had pointed out to him, Abraham built an altar there, and arranged the wood. Then Abraham stretched out his hand and seized the knife to kill Isaac. But the angel of God called to Abraham from heaven, saying 'Abraham, Abraham'. 'I am here' Abraham replied. 'Do not raise your hand against the child' the angel said. 'Do not harm Isaac, for now I know you fear God. You have not refused me your child, your only child.' Then looking up, Abraham saw a ram caught by its horns in a bush. Abraham took the ram and offered it as a burnt-offering in place of the child.



The angel of God called Abraham a second time from heaven. 'I swear by my own self – it is God who speaks – because you have done this, because you have not refused me your child, your only child, I will shower blessings on you, I will make

your descendants as many as the stars of heaven and the grains of sand on the seashore. Your descendants shall gain possession of the gates of their enemies. All the nations of the earth shall bless themselves by your descendants, as a reward for your obedience.'

Second Reading – Romans 8:31-34

With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare God's own Beloved One, but gave that One up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that God will not refuse us anything. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! Christ not only died for us – but rose from the dead, and there at God's side Christ stands and pleads for us.

Gospel – Mark 9:2-10

Jesus took Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. There in their presence Jesus was transfigured: his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus: 'Rabbi, it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' Peter did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Beloved, my Own. Listen



to this One.' Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them any more but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain, Jesus warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Promised One had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.

A Reflection by Pope Benedict XVI 12 March 2006,

Excerpt Today's Gospel reading (re-proposes) to us the episode of the Transfiguration of Christ on Mount Tabor. Awestruck at the sight of the transfigured Lord who was speaking with Moses and Elijah, Peter, James and John were suddenly overshadowed by a cloud, out of which came a voice which proclaimed: "This is my beloved Son on whom my favour rests; listen to him" (Mk 9: 7).

When one has the grace to live a strong experience of God, it is as if one is living an experience similar to that of the disciples during the Transfiguration: a momentary foretaste of what will constitute the happiness of Paradise. These are usually brief experiences that are sometimes granted by God, especially prior to difficult trials.

No one, however, is permitted to live "on Tabor" while on earth. Indeed, human existence is a journey of faith and as such, moves ahead more in shadows than in full light, and is no stranger to moments of obscurity and also of complete darkness. While we are on this earth, our relationship with God takes place more by listening than by seeing; and the same contemplation comes about, so to speak, with closed eyes, thanks to the interior light that is kindled in us by the Word of God.

The Virgin Mary herself, among all human creatures the closest to God, still had to walk day after day in a pilgrimage of faith (cf. Lumen Gentium, n. 58), constantly guarding and meditating on in her heart the Word that God addressed to her through Holy Scripture and through the events of the life of her Son, in whom she recognized and welcomed the Lord's mysterious voice.

And so, this is the gift and duty for each one of us during the season of Lent: to listen to Christ, like Mary. To listen to him in his Word, contained in Sacred Scripture. To listen to him in the events of our lives, seeking to decipher in them the messages

of Providence. Finally, to listen to him in our brothers and sisters, especially in the lowly and the poor, to whom Jesus himself demands our concrete love. To listen to Christ and obey his voice: this is the principle way, the only way, that leads to the fullness of joy and of love.

We pray for our parish community, especially those preparing for Christian initiation at Easter. May we listen intently to God's Beloved Son and faithfully follow Him.

We pray for the recently deceased; **Noel Sullivan, Carmel Moore**, and for those whose anniversary of death occurs around this time; **Peter Tan**. May they join Christ at God's right hand and reign with him for ever. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

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CHILD SAFE PARISH
