



Social Justice News

Social Justice Thought for the Week:



Pope Francis remarked on the 'social media socialization' of our emotions which he warns invalidating our deepest feelings – and our spirits.

Bishop Erik Varden, a Cistercian monk, advises us, at these last weeks in our Lenten journey, that we shouldn't domesticate God's Spirit, that it both comforts us, but also devours us.

Varden maintains that the Spirit is a 'refiner's fire'. He adds that some proponents of 'cheap spirituality' claim that the Spirit's gifts are restricted to providing 'mere shallow improvements to our 'normal self'. Instead, he maintains that praying for the coming of the Spirit takes courage, requiring a will to be re-made, to be made 'new'. As Dietrich Bonhoeffer maintains, the Spirit's coming is 'costly, but life-giving'.

Pope Francis also advises that this 2024 Lent provides opportunities to let the Spirit guide our looking within ourselves, and acknowledging our real identity, removing masks that we so often wear, slowing down the frantic pace of our lives, with the Lenten purpose of embracing the Spirit filled truth of who we are.

Finally, that we embrace the Spirit during Lent, to encourage all Christians to love all our brothers and sisters, to be considerate of and feel compassion and show mercy to others. Above all to 'share all that we are, and all that we have with those in need'.

THROUGH THE DESERT ... God leads us to freedom

As the season of Lent edges closer to Holy Week, the Vatican has released another graffiti style painting from Italian street artist Maupal. These art releases, have been arranged by the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development.

Each of the pieces feature Pope Francis taking part in activities that reflect on his 2024 Lenten theme: "Through the desert God leads us to freedom." Whereas the drawings of previous weeks have featured bleak landscapes, this week we are shown a much more lush environment. On a grassy field, Pope Francis dances with a man, woman, and two

On a grassy field, Pope Francis dances with a man, woman, and two children of diverse backgrounds, all joined in a circle while holding hands. The dancers revolve around a glass of clean water on a picnic blanket, and suggests they are celebrating the accessibility of clean drinking water.



Pope Francis' artistic facsimile has had a very busy Lent so far.

We've seen him push a wheelbarrow of faith through a desert of nails, stage a jailbreak to release prisoners from the shackles of "fear" and "hate," present young migrant soccer players with a green card, and topple world currencies from their seat on the pillar of idolatry.

This fifth painting released for Lent is a nod towards Pope Francis' 2015 environmental encyclical <u>Laudato Si</u>, which directs the faithful to care for our common home. The missive, which references water nearly 50 times, states of drinking water:

"Access to safe drinkable water is a basic and universal human right, since it is essential to human survival and, as such, is a condition for the exercise of other human rights."

There are two more Maupal drawings planned to be released from the Vatican before Easter. I look forward to bringing them to you as they arrive. *Fr. Jamie*



A Reflection by St Paul VI 11 April 1976

Holy Week! We want to honour your religious sense, your taste for the beauty of spiritual things, your understanding of the poem of the liturgy by exhorting you to consider these days of Holy Week as days to be discovered that are always new, always exceptional, always worthy of the utmost interest. The supreme vision of the world, of our life, of pain, of evil, of our final destiny passes before our gaze, while the drama of

redemption, with the cruel Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ and with his death and with his resurrection, exerts an incomparable fascination on the human spirit and on the entire Church, while the suggestion of ineffable rites attracts and moves us, if we just pay humble and intelligent attention to them.

Christ is present. We cannot be absent. It's not enough to give you a fleeting thought. It is not even enough to attend the celebratory rites as spectators. Now more than ever the liturgy demands our personal and community participation. Let us allow ourselves to be invaded by the Spirit that emanates from the celebration of these mysteries, and which attracts us all, shocks us and renews us. This is the time.

And let the impetus of the problems, evoked to act on our consciences, erupt; first with arrogance to re-establish true inner peace; then to tone in us the exact sensitivity of the inevitable questions of our existence, first among these the clarity on the religious ideas of our time, then the secret of pain, the value to be attributed to contemporary culture, the pressing duties for justice and for the social order (See AAS 48 (1956) 724), etc.; and finally our personal decision to carry our cross, that is, to duty, to love, to forgiveness, to sacrifice; yes, with Christ, for Christ. This is Christ's hour and it is our hour. Let us not miss the appointment of salvation. We will meet with Mary, given to us as a mother by her dying son.



THROUGH THE DESERT GOD LEADS US TO FREEDOM -

Latest Drawing Released

The sixth instalment in a series of seven "street art" inspired drawings has been released in time for Palm Sunday. The latest drawing features Pope Francis leading a group of cyclists as they race down a road.

In the scene, the group is just passing a sign that directs the road from "Profit" to the "Common Good."

The Pope is grinning as he leads the pack onward in the direction of the common good, while posed in an action shot that gives the appearance of biking at high speed.

Each of the six drawings released during Lent have featured Pope Francis taking part in a different activity – from dancing in a field at a picnic to staging a prison escape to breaking the bonds of "hate" and "fear."

The artist's style tends to focus on creating highly detailed — especially in the clothing — and emotive characters. On the dicastery webpage, the announcement of the new artwork points toward a passage of Pope Francis' Lenten message, in which he reminds us that the "love of God and love of neighbour are one love."

The Pope invites the faithful "to pause in the presence of God beside the flesh of our neighbour." With Easter Sunday fast approaching, the Vatican has just one more Maupal painting to release, which we will publish in the newsletter for the Easter weekend.
