



Social Justice Thought for the Week: Taking a break from Catholic Guilt

Most people I know struggle to feel worthy. No matter how many loved ones might reaffirm their wonderful qualities, human beings have a difficult time putting down their tools of self-criticism. "Catholic guilt" is yet another layer of this self-doubt spiral for many of us, mixing in a pinch of fear of eternal damnation with our run of the mill negative self-talk.

And while there is much that God asks of us in Scripture. A reading from Isaiah might remind you of a familiar New Testament scene: Jesus' Transfiguration, which can offer a balm that we sorely need.

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus takes several disciples with him to the top of a mountain, where he begins to transform. Then, Moses and Elijah appear and begin speaking with him. Here's the part that sounds a lot like what we hear today. A cloud shadows over them, and the voice of God emerges: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased" (Mt 17:5).

The words from Isaiah - these are some serious responsibilities! But before any of that, God's first word is one of satisfaction. I am pleased with this beloved one, this servant who goes into

the world to do my will and make things better. Primarily, of course, this voice of God is pleased with Jesus Christ, the one who does God's will in the world perfectly.

As Christians, though, we are striving to be like Christ, to be his hands and feet in the work against today's struggles. And as human beings, we are already made in his image and likeness. What a gift-if we're modelled after Christ, we certainly can't be all bad.

Can you take a moment and let the message sink in that this beloved servant, so precious and pleasing to God, can be you, too? Our Lenten journey ought to help this sentiment resonate more with us, not less. Our sacrifices and penances are not meant to tear down our sense of worthiness, but to recalibrate our understanding of God and ourselves-and the relationship that exists in between.

Easter is almost within our grasp. In just a few days we'll celebrate the promise of new life, but for now, let's marinate in this old life for just a bit longer-the one in which we are, while not perfect, already chosen by God and striving to do right by that truth.


If you are hyper-aware of your responsibilities, and if you are overwhelmed by how hard you are trying to be good, you don't need to be reminded to feel shame or guilt. Instead, you need to be reminded that you already are good, you already are pleasing, you already are God's. This Holy Week, take a break from Catholic guilt, and take a slice of God's peace instead.

THROUGH THE DESERT ... God Leads us to Freedom

As the season of Lent drew to a close, the Vatican has released the last illustrated drawing on the Pope's 2024 Lenten message: "Through the desert God leads us to freedom." The artwork, all came from the hand of Italian street artist Maupal.

In Maupal's seventh and final vignette, Pope Francis takes centre stage, watering plants that are just beginning to grow. The potted plants are labelled "Faith," "Hope," and "Charity," the theological virtues of the Church.


The Pope is locking eyes with the viewer as he waters the plants, with a smile that is inviting each of us to take part in nourishing such virtues in our lives, and consequently, blessing our common home, as instructed in his 2015 encyclical *Laudato Si.*

Of all the drawings that have been produced for Lent, this one contains the most human figures by far. The Pope is surrounded by a large crowd, with 34 distinct characters, and a sea of grey silhouettes giving the impression of a crowd to rival World Youth Day.

It is possibly the most varied, artistically, as well. The figures seem to be "collared with many different palates, and the line work shows different styles", representing the rich diversity of the Catholic Faith, which draws in cultures from all over the world.

On the dicastery webpage, it states that this new artwork points toward a passage of Pope Francis' Lenten message, in which he reminds us that the "love of God and love of neighbour are one love." The Pope invites the faithful "to pause in the presence of God beside our neighbour."

The drawings and their back story are available for viewing on the website of the Dicastery for Integral Human Development, who organised the weekly release of the collaboration during Lent. For those who may not have access to the internet, the previous six drawings are reprinted here.




Planned Giving:

Scripture Readings – Easter Sunday

First Reading – Acts 10:34, 37-43

Peter addressed the gathering assembled at the home of Cornelius. Peter said: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth who began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed Jesus with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything Jesus did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed Jesus by



hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised to life this Jesus who was seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses – we have eaten and drunk with Jesus after his resurrection from the dead – and he has ordered us to proclaim this to the people and to tell them that God has appointed Christ to judge everyone, alive or dead. Jesus is the one to whom all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

The Word of God.

Responsorial Psalm – Psalm 50

This is the day our God has made; let us rejoice and be glad.

Give thanks to our God, whose love has no end. Let the children of Israel say: 'God's love has no end.' R.

God's strong arm has triumphed; and has raised me up. I shall not die, I shall live and recount God's deeds. R.

The stone which the builders rejected has become the corner stone. This is the work of our God, a marvel in our eyes. R.

Second Reading – Colossians 3:1-4

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's side. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – who is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with Christ.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple,

the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken Jesus out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'

So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over Jesus' head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place



by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that Jesus must rise from the dead.

A Reflection by St Benedict XVI 12 April 2009



"Christ, our Paschal lamb, has been sacrificed!" (1 Cor 5:7). On this day, Saint Paul's triumphant words ring forth, words that we have just heard in the second reading, taken from his First Letter to the Corinthians. It is a text which originated barely twenty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus, and yet – like many Pauline passages – it already contains, in an impressive synthesis, a full awareness of the newness of life in Christ. The central symbol of salvation history – the Paschal lamb – is here identified with Jesus, who is called "our Paschal lamb". The Hebrew Passover, commemorating the liberation from

slavery in Egypt, provided for the ritual sacrifice of a lamb every year, one for each family, as prescribed by the Mosaic Law. In his passion and death, Jesus reveals himself as the Lamb of God, "sacrificed" on the Cross, to take away the sins of the world. He was killed at the very hour when it was customary to sacrifice the lambs in the Temple of Jerusalem. The meaning of his sacrifice he himself had anticipated during the Last Supper, substituting himself – under the signs of bread and wine – for the ritual food of the Hebrew Passover meal. Thus we can truly say that Jesus brought to fulfilment the tradition of the ancient Passover, and transformed it into his Passover.

On the basis of this new meaning of the Paschal feast, we can also understand Saint Paul's interpretation of the "leaven". The Apostle is referring to an ancient Hebrew usage: according to which, on the occasion of the Passover, it was necessary to remove from the household every tiny scrap of leavened bread. On the one hand, this served to recall what had happened to their forefathers at the time of the flight from Egypt: leaving the country in haste, they had brought with them only unleavened bread. At the same time, though, the "unleavened bread" was a symbol of purification: removing the old to make space for the new. Now, Saint Paul explains, this ancient tradition likewise acquires a new meaning, once more derived from the new "Exodus", which is Jesus' passage from death to eternal life. And since Christ, as the true Lamb, sacrificed himself for us, we too, his disciples – thanks to him and through him – can and must be the "new dough", the "unleavened bread", liberated from every residual element of the old yeast of sin: no more evil and wickedness in our heart.

"Let us celebrate the feast ... with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth". This exhortation from Saint Paul, which concludes the short reading that was proclaimed a few moments ago, resounds even more powerfully in the context of the Pauline Year. Dear brothers and sisters, let us accept the Apostle's invitation; let us open our spirit to Christ, who has died and is risen in order to renew us, in order to remove from our hearts the poison of sin and death, and to pour in the life-blood of the Holy Spirit: divine and eternal life. In the Easter Sequence, in what seems almost like a response to the Apostle's words, we sang: "Scimus Christum surrexisse a mortuis vere" – we know that Christ has truly risen from the dead. Yes, indeed! This is the fundamental core of our profession of faith; this is the cry of victory that unites us all today. And if Jesus is risen, and is therefore alive, who will ever be able to separate us from him? Who will ever be able to deprive us of the love of him who has conquered hatred and overcome death?

The Easter proclamation spreads throughout the world with the joyful song of the Alleluia. Let us sing it with our lips, and let us sing it above all with our hearts and our lives, with a manner of life that is "unleavened", that is to say, simple, humble, and fruitful in good works. "Surrexit Christus spes mea: praecedet vos in Galileam" – Christ my hope is risen, and he goes before you into Galilee. The Risen One goes before us and he accompanies us along the paths of the world. He is our hope, He is the true peace of the world. Amen!

The reality for the Holy Land mission is that they will continue to face challenges financial and spiritual and so we again ask Catholics around the world again to be as generous as possible, with their financial support as well as the spiritual support.
