

Social Justice Thought for the Week:

World Earth Day was marked on April 22 (Earth Day)

Marking World Earth Day, Pope Francis reiterated his urgent plea for bold action for "our common home" and for world peace.

The international day was established in 1970 to raise awareness about the critical environmental challenges facing the planet and to mobilise efforts to address them. The observance provides an opportunity for individuals, communities, organisations, and governments to come together and engage in activities to repair and heal ecosystems, combat climate change, and preserve biodiversity, so as to preserve the planet for future generations.

In a post on his social media platform, Pope Francis noted that his generation has bequeathed many monetary riches to later generations, but has done little to protect the planet.

He also commented on the link between current environmental problems and the many conflicts raging throughout the world.



"Our generation has bequeathed many riches, but we have failed to protect the planet and we are not safeguarding peace. We are called to become artisans and caretakers of our common home, the Earth which is "falling into ruin".

Pope's post echoed his words in the 2015 Encyclical Laudato Si': On Care of Our Common Home and its call for individuals, communities and governments to care for nature.

Each year, Earth Day has a specific theme to draw global attention on pressing environmental issues. Under the banner "Planet vs. Plastics," this 54th edition is focused on plastic pollution and the urgent need to reduce its use and production. Beyond its environmental implications, the proliferation of plastics poses a significant threat to human health, akin to the challenges posed by climate change. Humans produce over 400 million metric tons of plastic annually, which is roughly the weight of all human beings on the planet. Only 9 per cent gets recycled, and about 22 per cent of plastic waste worldwide is either not collected, improperly disposed of, or ends up as litter.

Scripture Readings — Fifth Sunday of Easter

First Reading - Acts 9:26-31

When Saul got to Jerusalem and tried to join the disciples, they were all afraid: they could not believe Saul was really a disciple. Barnabas, however, took charge of him, introduced him to the apostles, and explained how the Christ had appeared to Saul and spoken to him on his journey, and how Saul had preached boldly at Damascus in the name of Jesus. Saul now started to go round with them in Jerusalem, preaching fearlessly in the name of Christ. But after Saul had spoken to Hellenists, and argued with them, they became determined to kill him. When the community of believers knew, they took Saul to Caesarea, and sent him off from there to Tarsus. The churches throughout the Judea, Galilee and Samaria were now left in peace, building themselves up, living in the fear of God, and filled with the consolation of the Holy Spirit.

The Word of God

My vows I will perform before those who fear you, O God. The poor shall eat and shall have their fill. They shall praise you, those who seek you. May their hearts live for ever and ever. [R]

All the earth shall remember and return to you, O God, all families of the nations worship before you. They shall worship you, all the mighty of the earth; before you shall bow all who go down to the dust. [R]

And my soul shall live for you, O God, my children serve you. They shall tell of you to generations yet to come, declare your faithfulness to peoples yet unborn: 'These things our God has done.' [R]

Second Reading –John 3: 18-24

My children, our love is not to be just words or mere talk, but something real and active; only by this can we be certain that we are the children of the truth and be able to quieten our conscience in God's presence, whatever accusations it may raise against us, because God is greater than our conscience and knows everything. My dear people, if we cannot be condemned by our conscience, we need not be afraid in God's presence, and whatever we ask God, we shall receive, because we keep the commandments and live the kind of life that God wants. God's commandments are these: that we believe in the name of God's Chosen One, Jesus Christ, and that we love one another as we have been commanded. Whoever keep God's commandments live in God and God lives in them. We know that God lives in us by the Spirit given to us.

Gospel Acclamation -

Alleluia, alleluia!

Live in me and let me live in you, says the Lord;my branches bear much fruit.

Alleluia!

Gospel - John 15:1-8

Jesus said to the disciples:

"I am the true vine, every branch in me that bears no fruit is cut away, and every branch that does bear fruit is pruned to make it bear even more. You are pruned already, by means of the word that I have spoken to you. Make your home in me, as I make mine in you. As a branch cannot bear fruit all by itself, but must remain part of the vine, neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever remain in me, with me in them, bear fruit in plenty; for cut off from me you can do nothing. Whoever do not remain in me are like branches that have been thrown away-they wither; these branches are collected and thrown on the fire, and they are burnt. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, you may ask what you will and you shall get it. It is to the glory of God, who sent me, that you should bear much fruit, and then you will be my disciples".

Reflection By Pope Francis

The Word of God, even on this Fifth Sunday of Easter, continues to indicate to us the way and the conditions to be a community of the Risen Lord. Last Sunday the relationship between the believer and Jesus the Good Shepherd was highlighted. Today the Gospel offers us the moment in which Jesus introduces himself as the true vine and invites us to abide in him so as to bear much fruit (cf.

Jn 15:1-8). The vine is a plant whose branches form the whole; and the branches are only fruitful insofar as they are joined with the vine. This relationship is the secret of Christian life and John the Evangelist expresses this with the word 'abide', which is repeated seven times in today's passage. "Abide in me", says the Lord; abide in the Lord.

It means abiding in the Lord in order to find the courage to step outside of ourselves, from our comfort zone, from our limited and protected spaces, in order to cast ourselves into the open sea of the needs of others and to give a wide range to our Christian witness in the world. This courage to step outside ourselves and to advance the needs of others is born from faith in the Risen Lord and from the certainty that his Spirit accompanies our history. One of the ripest fruits that springs from communion with Christ is, in fact, the commitment to charity for our neighbour, loving brothers and sisters with self-sacrifice, to the point of the final consequences, as Jesus loved us. The dynamism of believers' charity is not the result of strategies; it is not born of external stresses, of social or ideological concerns, but rather, it is born from the encounter with Jesus and from abiding in Jesus. For us he is the vine whose sap — that is, 'life' — we absorb, in order to convey into society a different way of living and self-spending which places the least in first place.

When we are intimate with the Lord, as the vine and branches are intimate and joined, we are able to bear the fruits of new life, of mercy, of justice and peace, derived from the Lord's Resurrection. It is what the Saints did, those who lived Christian life in fullness and lived the witness of charity, because they were true branches of the vine of the Lord. But "to be holy does not require being a bishop, a priest or a religious.... We are all called to be holy by living our lives with love and by bearing witness in everything we do, wherever we find ourselves" (Apostolic Exhortation Gaudete et Exsultate, 14). We are all called to be holy; we must be holy with this richness we have received from the Risen Lord. Every activity — work and rest, family and social life, exercising political, cultural and economic responsibilities — every activity, whether small or great, if lived in union with Jesus and with the attitude of love and of service, is an occasion to live Baptism and Gospel holiness to the fullest.


