Social Justice News

Social Justice Thought for the Week:

Pentecost in Nature

Today we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost and we propose that you begin your day with a contemplative prayer in nature, invoking the Holy Spirit to guide you and allow you to perceive the divine presence in every element of creation. Encounter with Creation: A Guided Meditation –

- 1. Find a natural setting near your home that resonates with your spirit.
- 2. Disconnect your phone or switch to airplane mode to eliminate distraction. Consider setting an alarm for 15 to 20 minutes to guide your meditation session gently.
- 3. Approach your chosen spot and sit comfortably, allowing your hands to rest gently on your thighs. If possible, consider removing your shoes to establish a deeper connection with the earth.
- 4. Begin by taking three slow, deep breaths, allowing the rhythm of your breath to anchor you in the present moment.
- 5. Take in the landscape around you, immersing yourself in the sights, smells, colours, and sounds of nature. Seek to view everything with fresh eyes, embracing a new perspective.
- 6. Should thoughts arise during your meditation, acknowledge them without judgement and allow them to pass like leaves on a stream. Consider keeping a journal nearby to capture any persistent thoughts that arise, allowing you to return to them later if needed...

Remember, meditation is a practice. Be patient with yourself, and approach each session with openness and curiosity, free from expectation or self-criticism.

May this time of meditation deepen your connection with the beauty and sacredness of God's creation, nurturing your spirit and guiding you on your journey of faith.

PENTECOST MOMENTS IN THE EVERYDAY

This week the priests of the Diocese have been meeting (over two days) with Bishop Ken Howell.

The days could easily have been described as a real PENTECOST moment for the local church. Bishop Ken outlined his desire to "Look, Listen and Learn" in these relatively early stages of his tenure as Bishop of Toowoomba.

He said that we must value, and even treasure the past, but we should not live there. Pilgrim people are always moving forward.

Sr. Monica Cavanagh led us in our discussion, drawing on the Synod on Synodality as basis for our deliberations. Synodality – 'everybody journeying together' – is a profound movement of the Holy Spirit and represents a diversity that requires active discernment with the whole church.



Synodality is a spiritual journey, discerning the call of God to the church of today to be a church in dialogue with the world. A synodal church is a "church going forth" – a missionary church 'whose doors are open'.

We were encouraged to look at synodality as *a process*, a way of life – and not just something that happens and then it is over. The process could be described listening > then dialogue > to discernment and > to decision making, that leads to > action.

Pope Francis encourages us to look at a synodal church as a church which listens – more than simply hearing. It is that we must be open to listening to the heartbeat of the world, for listening breathes love and grace into others stories.

The question put to us as a presbyterate, we could ask of ourselves, attentively listening to God: "How do I listen to the movement of God in my life? This contemplative dialogue process used in our discussion was called "Conversations in the Spirit". What emerged from our conversation was a desire to strike a balance in our communities.

A balance between ministry and administration. A balance between the role of the ordained minister and the lay faithful. Utilising the gifts of all of the people, but not getting caught in an institutional process. As priests we must move towards taking practical steps to affirm and encourage the gifts of the lay faithful.

When looking to where we should be as a diocese in five years' time, the statement was made to 'release the spirit among the people' and look to a whole new way of operating and don't be afraid of making mistakes. As the late Fr. Jeff Scully used to say in Quilpie: "keep the rumour of God alive!" – by walking down the street and talking to people!

Sounds like a real PENTECOST moment to me.

Scripture Readings – Pentecost Sunday

First Reading – Acts 2:1-11

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.



Now there were devout people living in Jerusalem from every nation under

heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, all bewildered to hear these people speaking their own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these speakers are Galileans? How does it happen that we all hear them in our own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

The Word of God.

Responsorial Psalm – Psalm 46 O God, send out your Spirit and renew the face of the earth.

Bless your God, my soul! O God, how great you are, how many are your works, O God! The earth is full of your riches. [R]

You take back your spirit, they die, returning to the dust from which they came.

You send forth your spirit, they are created; and you renew the face of the earth. [R]

May your glory O God, last for ever! May you rejoice in your works! May my thoughts be pleasing to you. I find my joy in you, O God. **[R]**

Second Reading – Galatians 5:16-25

If you are guided by the Spirit you will be in no danger of yielding to self-indulgence, since self-indulgence is the opposite of the Spirit, the Spirit is totally against such a thing, and it is precisely because the two are so opposed that you do not always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you. When self-indulgence is at work the results are obvious: indecent behaviour; idolatry and sorcery; feuds and wrangling, jealousy, bad temper and quarrels; disagreements, factions, envy; drunkenness and similar things. I warn you now, as I warned you before: those who behave like this will not inherit the kingdom of God. What the Spirit brings is very different: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. There can be no law against things like that, of course. You cannot belong to Christ Jesus unless you crucify all self-indulgent passions and desires.

Since the Spirit is our life, let us be directed by the Spirit.

Alleluia, alleluia! Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Alleluia!

Gospel - John 15:26-27; 16:12-15

Jesus said to the disciples:

'When the Advocate comes, whom I shall send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who issues from the Father, will be my witness. And you too will be witnesses, because you have been with me from the outset. I still have many things to say to you but they would be too much for you now. But when the Spirit of truth comes you will be led to the complete truth, since the Spirit will not be speaking as from the Spirit's own authority but will say only what has been learnt; telling you of the things to come. The Spirit will glorify me, since all you will be told will be taken from what is mine. Everything God has is mine; that is why I said:

All the Spirit tells you will be taken from what is mine.' The Gospel of the Lord.

Homily Of Pope Benedict XVI 4 June 2006

On the day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit descended with power upon the Apostles; thus began the mission of the Church in the world.

Jesus himself prepared the Eleven for this mission, appearing to them on many occasions after his Resurrection (cf. Acts 1: 3).

Prior to the Ascension into Heaven, he ordered them "not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the promise of the Father" (cf. Acts 1: 4-5); that is, he asked them to stay together to prepare themselves to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. And they gathered in prayer with Mary in the Upper Room, awaiting the promised event (cf. Acts 1: 14).

To stay together was the condition laid down by Jesus in order to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit; the premise of their harmony was prolonged prayer. In this way we are offered a formidable lesson for every Christian community.

Some think at times that missionary effectiveness depends primarily on careful programming and its subsequent intelligent application through a concrete commitment.

The Lord certainly does ask for our collaboration, but before any other response his initiative is necessary: his Spirit is the true protagonist of the Church. The roots of our being and of our action are in the wise and provident silence of God.

The images used by St Luke to indicate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit - wind and fire - recall Sinai, where God revealed himself to the people of Israel and offered his covenant (cf. Ex 19: 3ff.). The feast of Sinai, which Israel celebrated 50 days after the Passover, was the feast of the Covenant. Speaking of the tongues of fire (cf. Acts 2: 3), St Luke wants to show Pentecost as a new Sinai, as the feast of the New Covenant, where the Covenant with Israel is extended to all the nations of the earth.

The Church has been catholic and missionary from her birth. The universality of salvation is meaningfully manifested with the list of the numerous ethnic groups to which those who heard the Apostles' first proclamation belonged (cf. Acts 2: 9-11). The People of God, which had found its first configuration in Sinai, extends today to the point of surmounting every barrier of race, culture, space and time. As opposed to what occurred with the tower of Babel (cf. Gn 11: 1-9), when people wanted to build a way to heaven with their hands and ended up by destroying their very capacity of mutual understanding, in Pentecost the Spirit, with the gift of tongues, demonstrates that his presence unites and transforms confusion into communion.

Human pride and egoism always create divisions, build walls of indifference, hate and violence. The Holy Spirit, on the other hand, makes hearts capable of understanding the languages of all, as he re-establishes the bridge of authentic communion between earth and heaven. The Holy Spirit is Love. But how is it possible to enter into the mystery of the Holy Spirit? How can the secret of Love be understood?

The Gospel passage takes us today to the Upper Room where, after the Last Supper, a sense of loss has saddened the Apostles. This is due to the fact that Jesus' words arouse disturbing questions: He spoke of the world's hatred of him and of his own, he spoke of his mysterious departure; and there were still many other things to be said, but for the time being the Apostles were not able to bear the weight (cf. Jn 16: 12).

To console them, he explains the meaning of his departure: he will go, but he will return; meanwhile, he will not abandon them, will not leave them orphans. He will send the Consoler, the Spirit of the Father, and the Spirit will enable them to understand that Christ's work is a work of love: love of the One who gave himself, love of the Father who has given him. This is the mystery of Pentecost: the Holy Spirit illuminates the human spirit and, by revealing Christ Crucified and Risen, indicates the way to become more like him, that is, to be "the image and instrument of the love which flows from Christ" (Deus Caritas Est, n. 33).



The Church, gathered with Mary as at her birth, today implores: "Veni, Sancte Spiritus! - Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love!". Amen.


