

FINDING FREEDOM: FAMILY

This weekend marks the commencement of Refugee Week in Australia. It is always held from Sunday to Saturday of the week which includes June 20, World Refugee Day.



This is not to be confused with Migrant and Refugee Sunday organised by the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference. That celebration will take place later in the year at the end of September.

Refugee Week is organised by the Refugee Council of Australia. To mark the occasion, we will welcome Josephine Mardini to speak at the Masses next weekend at the close of Refugee Week for this year.

It is interesting to note that World Refugee Day is celebrated globally, but Refugee Week is held only in a limited number of countries. The United Kingdom followed Australia's lead in 1998 and became the second country to celebrate Refugee Week.

Now Refugee Week events are held in Australia, UK, Greece, Malta, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Berlin. Apart from traditional local events which bring people together to meet, eat and celebrate, the aims of Refugee Week are:

- to educate the Australian public about who refugees are and why they have come to Australia;
- to help people understand the many challenges refugees face coming to Australia;
- to celebrate the contribution refugees make to our community;
- to focus on how the community can provide a safe and welcoming environment for refugees;
- for community groups and individuals to do something positive for refugees, people seeking asylum and displaced people, within Australia but also around the world; and
- for service providers to reflect on whether they are providing the best possible services to refugees.

Scripture Readings - Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary time



First Reading – Ezekiel 17:22-24

The Most High God says this: ' From the top of the cedar, from the highest branch I will take a shoot and plant it myself on a very high mountain.

I will plant it on the high mountain of Israel. It will sprout branches and bear fruit, and become a noble cedar.

Every kind of bird will live beneath it, every winged creature rest in the shade of its branches.

And every tree of the field will learn that I, the Most High, am the one who stunts tall trees and makes the low ones grow, who withers green trees and makes the withered green. I, your God, have spoken, and I will do it.'

This is the Word of God.

Responsorial Psalm – 91 R: O God, it is good to give thanks to you.

It is good to give thanks to you, O God, to make music to your name, O Most High, to proclaim your love in the morning and your truth in the watches of the night. [*R*]

The just will flourish like the palm tree and grow like a Lebanon cedar. [R]

Planted in the house of God they will flourish in the courts of our God, still bearing fruit when they are old, still full of sap, still green, to proclaim that our God is just.

In God, our rock, there is no wrong. [R]

Second Reading – St Paul to the Corinthians 5:6-10

We are always full of confidence, even though we remember that to live in the body means to be exiled from Christ Jesus – for we walk by faith and not by sight. Yes, we are full of confidence, I say, and actually want to be exiled from the body and make our home with Christ. Whether we are living in the body or exiled from it, we are intent on pleasing Christ. For all the truth about us will be brought out in the law court of Christ, and each of us will get what we deserve for the things we did in the body, good or bad.

This is the Word of God.

Gospel Acclamation –

Alleluia, alleluia! The seed is the word of God, Christ is the sower; all who come to him will live forever. says the Lord. Alleluia!

Gospel – Mark 4:26-34

Jesus said to the crowds: 'This is what the reign of God is like. A sower throws seeds on the land. Night and day, while the sower sleeps, and then wakes, the seed is sprouting and growing; how the sower does not know. Of its own accord the land produces first the shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the crop is ready, the sower loses no time, starting to reap because that harvest has come.'



Jesus also said, 'What can we say the reign of God is like? What parable can we find for it? It is like a mustard seed which at the time of its sowing in the soil is the smallest of all the seeds on the earth; yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade.'

Using many parables like these, Jesus spoke the word to them, so far as they were capable of understanding it.

Jesus would not speak to them in parables, but explained everything to the disciples when they were alone.

This is the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Pope Francis: An encounter with a migrant is an encounter with Christ



In his message for the World Day of Migrants and Refugees, Pope Francis invites us to see migrations as a sign of the times and as a symbol of the Church's pilgrimage throughout history.

"See in the migrants of our time, as in those of every age, a living image of God's people on their way to the eternal homeland," writes Pope Francis in his 2024 <u>Message</u> for the 110th World Day of *Migrants and Refugees*.

The World Day is a call to believers to show support and closeness to the millions of men, women and children who are forced to leave their homes. The current global estimate is that there were around 281 million international migrants in the world in 2020, which equates to 3.6 per cent of the

global population, and that number continues to rise.

Pointing out that God not only walks with His people, but also within them, the Pope invites us all to walk in a "synodal" way - in the Church and in the world - in order to move forward on our own pilgrimage toward the heavenly homeland.

Pope's June prayer intention: 'For those fleeing their own countries'

The message's title, "God walks with His people," immediately points to the synodal dimension the Pope constantly invites the Church and the people of God to live every day and in every moment.

The Pope writes, "Synodality is mainly presented as a joint journey of the People of God" that allows the Church "to rediscover its itinerant nature, as the People of God journeying through history on pilgrimage, 'migrating', we could say, toward the Kingdom of Heaven."

Thus, as he so often does, the Pope calls us to recognize the Lord present in the millions of people who are forced to migrate due to conflict, persecution, poverty, and the climate crisis, "as a living image of God's people on their way to the eternal homeland."


