


The Catholic Church in Australia will mark Safeguarding Sunday 2024 on the 8th September, at the conclusion of National Child Protection Week. Safeguarding Sunday seeks to acknowledge the immense damage caused by the sexual abuse of children and adults at risk, including by priests, religious and lay people within Catholic contexts. It makes a commitment to practices and protocols that create and maintain safe environments for all

people. It invites people to pray for those harmed by abuse directly and indirectly.

his year Safeguarding Sunday has adopted the theme of National Child Protection Week - "Every conversation matters". Embracing this theme, we are reminded that every conversation about safeguarding matters. Children and adults at risk are more likely to raise concerns and issues in an organisation that empowers and listens to them, and creating space for children and adults to have a say in decisions that affect them is an integral part of every safe organisation.

Resources, including for liturgical celebrations, have been created to support local recognition of Safeguarding Sunday. They include parish notices, prayers of intercession, prayer slides and social media images. Recycling in the Toowoomba Region

There is very little that needs to be thrown in your red-lidded (garbage) bin to end up in land fill. Watch this space over the coming weeks for recycling tips.

Reducing your waste is a much better option than recycling. Buy in bulk, refuse extra packaging – do what you can to reduce the waste stream. Second best is to reuse old containers and packages if you can. If you can't reduce or reuse, then recycling is the way to go.

Your household recycle bin

Many items can be recycled through your yellow-lidded recycle bin. To note, however:

- Glass from broken recyclable bottles or jars **can't** be recycled as it can't be automatically sorted and processed.
- Any recyclables disposed of in plastic bags will be rejected and landfilled.
- Liquids and oils (e.g. cooking, motor vehicle, etc.) will contaminate a load and cause it to be landfilled. (Take these to a local Waste Management site, e.g. at O'Mara's Rd or Kleinton)
- Batteries, particularly lithium ion types, can and do start fires in trucks and facilities.
- Used nappies and disposable wipes are a biological hazard to waste management workers.

Your green waste bin

Garden prunings, lawn clippings and branches up to 15cm diameter and 50cm length are among the items you can place in this bin.

OPENING OUR EYES AND EARS TO THE BEAUTY AROUND US

Jesus' healing of the man with a hearing and speech impediment led to the inclusion of a gesture of touching the

ears and mouth of the one who is being baptised within the Baptismal Liturgy.

This ritual reflects actions of Jesus in today's Gospel. At Baptism, the candidate's ears and mouth are touched while the priest prays, 'Ephpheta: that is, be opened, that you may profess the faith you hear, to the praise and glory of God'.

There's a parallel moment during the Eucharist when we the baptised sign our forehead, lips and heart at the start of the Gospel. We're praying in body language for our minds to be enlightened, our words to be inspired, and our hearts to be transformed.

Done thoughtfully, it's a simple but powerful action ... and an appropriate prayer upon which to reflect on this Safeguarding Sunday, falling as it does at the end of Child Protection Week. Fr Jamie

Now suppose someone comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor person comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed one, and say, "Come this way to the best seats;' then you tell the poor one, 'Stand over there' or 'You can

sit on the floor by my foot -rest.'

Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that? Listen, my dear sisters and brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the realm promised to those who love God.

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle.



Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened, and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said, 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

- 7. We pray for the peoples of the Pacific under threat from rising ocean levels, that their plea for urgent and effective climate action will be heard and heeded, especially during this Season of Creation. Lord, hear us.
- 8. We pray for those who have died recently Simon Doyle and Fay Perkins and for those whose anniversary of death occurs around this time, that they will become a wholly new creation in Christ. Lord, hear us.
