



Thought for the Week: 110th World Day of Migrants and Refugees

Pope Francis's theme for the 110th World Day of Migrants and Refugees is "God walks with his people". He says that "Many migrants experience God as their travelling companion, guide and anchor of salvation". Through their exile, wilderness journey and final arrival, the people who were following Moses discovered that they were really following God, who went before them and walked alongside them. The meeting tent that protected the ark of the covenant was a symbol of this presence; of a God who stayed close along the journey.

So many migrants and refugees face such challenges and difficulties along their way. They can be separated from families and loved ones, lost, bereaved, exhausted, hurt or afraid of the future. They can experience people who are unwelcoming or hostile to them in their time of vulnerability. James in his letter today reminds us that God sees the disregard and injustice of the rich and comfortable. Our relationship with those who are suffering has eternal implications.

GOD WALKS WITH HIS PEOPLE:

"... God not only walks with his people, but also within them, in the sense that he identifies himself with men and women on their journey through history, particularly with the least, the poor and the marginalized. In this we see an extension of the mystery of the Incarnation. ..." Pope Francis

As Pope Francis says, God not only walks *with* migrants and refugees, but *within* them. God "identifies himself with men and women on their journey through history, particularly with the least, the poor and the marginalised." In serving the least of our brothers and sisters, we encounter Jesus himself.

Therefore, as a Church walking a synodal journey together, we recognise God as our true guide along the way. We see value in shared leadership and our responsibility to welcome the stranger. In the symbols of our liturgy, we remember God's enduring presence, walking alongside and within each one of us.

May our prayer be: "To continue to keep walking, together with our migrant brothers and sisters, toward the eternal dwelling you have prepared for us. Open our eyes and our hearts so that every encounter with those in need becomes an encounter with Jesus, your Son and our Lord. Amen".

Scripture Readings



First Reading – Numbers 11:25-29

The Most High God came down in the cloud and spoke with Moses, then took some of the spirit that was on Moses and put it on the seventy elders. When the spirit came on them, they prophesied, but not again. Two men had stayed back in the camp; one named Eldad and the other Medad. The spirit came down on them; though they had not gone to the Tent, their names were enrolled among the rest. These began to

prophesy in the camp. The young man ran to tell Moses, 'Look Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp.' Then said Joshua, the son of Nun, who had served Moses from his youth, 'My Lord Moses, stop them!' Moses answered, "Are you jealous on my account? If only the whole people of God were prophets and the Spirit of the Most High were upon them all!' **The Word of God**

The law of our God is perfect, it revives the soul. The rule of our God is to be trusted, it gives wisdom to the simple. **(R)**

The fear of God is holy, abiding for ever. The decrees of God are truth and all of them just. (R)

So, in them your servant finds instruction; great reward is in their keeping. But who can detect all one's own errors? From hidden faults acquit me. **(R)**

Second Reading – James 5:1-6

An answer for the rich. Start crying, weep for the miseries that are coming to you. Your wealth is all rotting, your clothes are all eaten up by moths. All your gold and your silver are corroding away, and the same corrosion will be your own sentence, and eat into your body. It was a burning fire that you stored up as your treasure for the last days. Labourers mowed your fields, and you cheated them – listen to the wages that you kept back, calling out; realise that the cries of the reapers have reached the ears of the God of hosts. On earth you have had a life of comfort and luxury; in the time of slaughter you went on eating to your hearts content. It was you who condemned the innocent and killed them; they offered you no resistance. **The Word of God**

Gospel – Mark 9:38-43, 45, 47-48

John said to Jesus, 'Master, we saw a man who is not one of us casting out devils in your name; and because he was not one of us we tried to stop him.' But Jesus said, 'You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is for us. 'If anyone gives you a cup of water to

drink just because you belong to Christ, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward. 'But anyone who is an obstacle to bring down one of these little ones who have faith, would be better thrown into the sea with a great millstone round his neck. And if your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life crippled, than to have two hands and go to hell, into the fire that cannot be put out. And if your foot should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life lame, than to have two feet and be thrown into hell. And if your eye should cause you to sin, tear it out; it is better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye, than to have two eyes and be thrown into hell where their worm does not die nor their fire go out.

- **4.** For those who find themselves as strangers in a new land. May we recognise Jesus within them as we offer friendship and sustenance. Lord, hear us.
- 5. For our parish community.

May we walk the synodal journey together as we practice the habits of our eternal dwelling with God. Lord, hear us.

6. For those who have died, especially along the way of migrant journeys.

We remember Tom Schick and Terry Butler who died recently and all whose anniversaries occur about this time. May they find their place of rest in the Kingdom of God. Lord, hear us.

Presider: God of truth, you see every act of hospitality or rejection. Move within us to walk with those who are suffering on the way to justice, peace and freedom. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.
