

Social Justice News

Thought for the Week:

What is the poverty line in Australia?

In Australia, the poverty line is generally defined as 50% of median household income. This was \$489 a week for a single adult, \$783 for a sole parent with two children and \$1027 for a couple with two children in 2019-20.



How many people are living in poverty in Australia?

The ACOSS/UNSW Poverty in Australia 20232 report found:

- In Australia, there are more than 3.32 million people or 13.4% of the population living below the poverty line. That includes 761,000 children or 1 in 6.
- Many of those affected live in deep poverty on average the 'poverty gap' (the difference between the incomes of people in poverty in various types of families and the poverty line) was \$304 a week.

What has happened to poverty rates over the last 30 years?

Poverty declined in the early 2000s, rose in the boom years up to the GFC in 2008 and declined around 2009, mainly due to a pension increase granted to Age Pensioners in 2009, lifting many older people over the poverty line. Poverty stabilised during the decade prior to the pandemic in 2020. Despite the lockdowns and sharp recession, the increases in income support payments and support to business provided during the pandemic brought nearly 650,000 people out of poverty and protected hundreds of thousands of others from falling into poverty. Unfortunately, these were short lived, as increased payments – especially for JobSeeker and Parenting Payments – were withdrawn and replaced by a small permanent increase.

What does living in poverty really mean in Australia?

Poverty is about a lack of money – both income for now and savings or wealth. But it can also be about not having a lot of other things: affordable housing, access to good education or health services. While many Australians juggle payments of bills, people living in poverty have to miss out on essentials. They worry about becoming homeless, skipping meals, not heating or cooling their home and not being able to go to the doctor or afford medications.

"I have been skipping meals 2-3 times a week which has been happening more in the past 2-3 months... I've cut down a lot on meal sizes and basically live on noodles a lot." 57 year old female.

Report on October Meeting

At this week's meeting of St Anthony's Social Justice Group, we reviewed some recent events as well as making plans for the rest of the year. At Masses in September we reflected on, and gave thanks for God's gracious gift of creation. Inspiring videos, thought-provoking prayer and frequent allusions in the homily ran as a thread from 1 September to 4 October. Then, at the end of September, we celebrated Migrant and Refugee Sunday. We gave thanks through hymns and prayers in diverse languages from people from afar whom we now call friends. Such joyful singing from our multicultural choir!

Looking then to November, our group made detailed plans for 3 November - mark it in your diaries! – an afternoon of entertainment, fun and fellowship in support of the Dignity Project. Of course, it's our Melbourne Cup event. We'll hear more about that in the coming weeks. Finally, we looked forward to 17 November, World Day of the Poor, and how our parish community might support Vinnies as they start to prepare for back-to-school, 2025. Yes, it's not far away, and some families will need help with books, uniforms and other educational requirements.

All in all, life never seems to slow down for the Social Justice Group. Maybe you'd like to be part of it? Maybe a New Year Resolution could be to become involved in the struggle for justice in our troubled world. Come and join us.

Suffering Servant, Son of God, Supreme High Priest, Son of Man. Titles of Jesus are threaded through todays' readings. They trip off the tongue with ease yet confound us with the baffling mystery of who Jesus is.
