A WORD ON THIS WEEK'S READINGS

The root meaning of the word "apocalypse" is "revelation" or "disclosure." It's a name given to biblical

writings with visions and prophecies of the end times.

These works thrive on images of monumental battles and cosmic upheavals, so the word "apocalypse" also suggests things like calamity and disaster. Scenes of death, destruction and misery in war zones may be described as apocalyptic. This secular use of the word captures the nightmarish nature of situations but does not convey the ultimately hopeful message of the biblical books.

Believers have a responsibility to tell the unvarnished truth about catastrophic crises threatening the planet. They also have a mission: to spread hope in the ultimate triumph of the good. Unwavering hope unlocks energy for transforming action.

FURTHER REFLECTION

As I prepare to pray, I entrust any distractions to the Lord. I settle into stillness, perhaps quietly reciting the response from today's psalm as a mantra: 'Preserve me, God, I take refuge in you'. I read the passage through slowly until I become familiar with it.

Jesus is speaking to his disciples after leaving the Temple in Jerusalem during the days leading up to his Passion. Perhaps in my mind's eye, I picture myself there. I listen to Jesus, noticing the tone of his voice. I watch the disciples, imagining the expressions on their faces and how they are responding. What sense do I have of their mood?

How am I feeling as I hear Jesus's words? Perhaps challenged ... puzzled ... frightened ... absorbed ... comforted ...? Jesus's words are not meant to frighten his disciples, nor us. Rather they can offer consolation and hope that God is near, especially when we face difficulties or uncertain times. Which of his words are staying with me now? I tell Jesus why they are significant, and I listen to whatever he might be saying to me.

I ask the Holy Spirit to keep me watchful, praying for the wisdom and courage always to live by Jesus's teachings. Giving thanks, I end my prayer with an '*Our Father*...'

O God, it is you who are my portion and cup; it is you yourself who are my prize. I keep you ever in my sight: since you are at my side, I shall stand firm. **(R)**

And so my heart rejoices, my soul is glad; even my body shall rest in safety. For you will not leave my soul among the dead, nor let your beloved know decay. **(R)**

You will show me the path of life, the fullness of joy in your presence, at your side happiness for ever (R)

Second reading - Hebrews 10:11-14

All the priests stand at their duties every day, offering over and over again the same sacrifices which are quite incapable of taking sins away. He, on the other hand, has offered one single sacrifice for sins, and then taken his place forever, at the right hand of God, where he is now waiting until his enemies are made into a footstool for him. By virtue of that one single offering, he has achieved the eternal perfection of all whom he is sanctifying. When all sins have been forgiven, there can be no more sin offerings.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia! Be watchful, pray constantly, that you may be worthy to stand before the Son of Man. Alleluia! **Gospel - Luke 21:36** Jesus said to his disciples: 'In those days, after the time of distress, the sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness, the stars will come falling from heaven and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory; then too he will send the angels to gather his chosen from the four winds, from the ends of the world to the ends of heaven.

'Take the fig tree as a parable: as soon as its twigs grow supple and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. So with you when you see these things happening: know that he is near, at the very gates. I tell you solemnly, before this generation has passed away all these things will have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father.' **The Gospel of the Lord.**


